IOC PRESIDENT TALKS PENTATHLON WITH ELITE ATHLETES DURING WORLD CUP BUDAPEST



The **President of the International Olympic Committee, Kirsty Coventry**, watched the new-look Pentathlon for the first time before meeting a group of elite pentathletes to discuss the reimagined sport.

In the shadow of the vast Puskas Arena, President Coventry was joined by **European Olympic Committees President Spyros Capralos** and more than 70 National Olympic Committee leaders, IOC Members and Olympic decision-makers in a packed 2,000-capacity arena to watch the Women's Final at UIPM 2026 Pentathlon World Cup Budapest.

President Coventry also made time to meet with elite pentathletes and discover more about the transformed multisport that has been part of the Olympic programme for more than a century, with three decades of evolution culminating in the integration of Ninja-style Obstacle Racing, an elimination Fencing format and streamlined Swimming since the Paris 2024 Olympic Games.

Both Pentathlon gold medallists from that memorable Games, **Michelle Gulyas of Hungary** and **Ahmed Elgendy**

of **Egypt**, joined the meeting along with **Sofia Cabrera** of **Guatemala** and **Shuai Luo** of **China**, coordinated by UIPM Events Operations Assistant and 2018 Youth Olympic Games competitor **Eduardo Oliveira** of **Portugal**.

The visit and meeting took place during an unforgettable Women's Final on June 12 won by **Blanka Guzi** of **Hungary** to the delight of her home crowd. It was followed on 13 June by an equally exciting Men's Final won by **Marvin Dogue** of **Germany**.

President's reaction

UIPM President Rob Stull said: "I couldn't be more grateful to everyone involved in staging a hugely successful Pentathlon World Cup here in beautiful Budapest.
